

# Introducing the Post-Bachelor's Doctor of Nursing Practice (post-BS DNP)

Columbia University School of Nursing now offers advanced practice registered nurse (APRN) education at the doctoral level via the Post-Bachelor's Doctor of Nursing Practice (post-BS DNP) program. This program has entirely replaced our MSN programs for all specialties except Anesthesia, which can still be completed as an MSN. Take a look at the following chart to see how the new post-BS DNP program differs from the retired MSN program:
